Task description	1. Ask students to locate 'Context 4 Topic 2' . 2. Ask students to locate 'Key structures' in 2.1. 3. Ask students to look at all the 'tiles' in the first sentence. 4. Ask students to construct a coherent sentence using all the words given without looking at 'hint'. 5. Ask students to press 'hint' button if they are stuck. 6. Ask students to press 'submit' button to check their answers. 7. Ask students to complete the rest of the exercise on their own. 8. Remind them to use the 'restart' button as often as they need to.		



# SCHOLAR Lesson Outline

Differentiation (Alternative use)	<ol style="list-style-type: none"><li>1. Ask less confident students to look through '2.8 Learning points' before attempting the exercise.</li><li>2. Tell less confident students to press 'hint' button before attempting the exercise.</li><li>3. Ask more confident students to look at the 'hint' and write their own sentences.</li></ol>
Hints & Tips	<p>This task is best done individually. Students will quickly lose interest if the session is not hands on!</p> <p>Ask students to first locate the pronouns and verbs if finding the task difficult.</p> <p>Remind students where adverbs should be placed when constructing a Chinese sentence.</p>
Notes	<p>Some students may not know what 'pronouns' and 'verbs' are.</p> <p>Some students may try to use the 'English' structure when constructing sentences in Chinese.</p>
